On the Strait and Narrow ...

Bill Riley, WSDOT Maintenance Operations Superintendent for the Olympic Region, reports that the work done on Highway 112 this past summer was done to prepare for the chip seal project in 2007. If you are wondering about the bright orange fencing along the roadway, it is simply to delineate an environmentally sensitive area for the contractors to use as a guide in their work areas.

The **Hood Canal Bridge** closure mitigation plan is moving forward for the six week closure in May-June of 2009. See details on the mitigation plan, construction progress, project timelines, quarterly reports and contact information at <u>www.hoodcanalbridge.com</u>.

The Washington State Patrol has had a busy summer and hopes that drivers will work hard to drive defensively as we enter the fall and winter seasons. Troopers have responded to a record number of fatality collisions involving motorcycles. 39% of these were single vehicle collisions. 75% were caused by the motorcycle ... speeding, DUI, inattention, improper braking technique. Alcohol/drugs were present with 13 of the deceased operators, with another 14 cases pending toxicology reports. 40% of this year's motorcycle fatalities involved an unendorsed rider. WSP wants to remind all motorcycle operators to get the proper endorsement and take advanced motorcycle training classes.

As for the winter time, the rule of thumb is to increase following distance to allow for greater stopping distance on slick and wet road surfaces. Now is the time to check your tires and make sure you have adequate tread depth, 3/32" is the law but replacement is recommended before tires are worn that low. The hot summer has probably taken its toll on windshield wipers and, with the rain we get along SR112, it is best to replace them now.

A big thank you to the WSDOT, County Road, and PUD workers who got us through the winter weather and storms and continue to work on stabilizing roads and utilities for our safety. And a thank you also to those who deliver papers, mail and goods under stressful conditions on the road. Your efforts are greatly appreciated by your community.

Local law enforcement and emergency service personnel are also on alert during times of high storm and winter weather concerns. This message is from the Washington State Patrol office, Trooper Brian George ...

"Troopers assigned to the North Olympic Peninsula work hard to keep drivers safe as they travel along the highways. In 2005 troopers investigated 80 collisions along SR112. With help from the community, troopers would like to see this number go down in 2006. Drivers can keep themselves and their neighbors safe by driving attentively and defensively. Here are a few ways you can drive defensively:

The number one way to keep yourself and your passengers safe: BUCKLE UP! Increase following distance to account for increased stopping distance required in inclement weather (even rain).

Follow posted speed limits and slow down when hazards such as heavy rain or congested traffic are present.

Remember ~ when entering or crossing the highway, main line traffic always has the right of way.

Following is a look at the Washington State Patrol activity along the 61 mile stretch of SR112 in 2005:

DUI arrests: 17 ~~ Speed contacts: 782 (does not mean all were cited, approx. 50% of drivers stopped for speed are cited) ~~DUI collisions: 8 ~~ Speed collisions: 35 ~~ Non-reportable collisions: 19 (the collision was non-injury and damage was under \$750) ~~ Property damage only collisions: 36 ~~ Injury collisions: 24 ~~ Fatalities: 1

Total collisions: 80"
